# Housing Executive launches new mobile app and payment telephone number

The new payment app and phone line has been available from 1 October 2023.

The Housing Executive has developed a new updated mobile phone App and a new telephone payment number for tenants and customers. They are a convenient way for tenants to pay their rent, service charges, damages or repairs and legal costs, and housing benefit overpayments.

The new App can be downloaded free of charge directly from the Apple App or Google Play stores, by searching 'Housing Executive' or 'NIHE.'

The App can also be used to make payments at any of the over 450 PayPoint machines in local stores across Northern Ireland. Caroline Connor, Assistant Director of Housing Services who oversees income collection for the Housing Executive, said: "The new mobile phone App and telephone system will give tenants and customers quick and convenient payment options, that can be made 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to fit in with busy lifestyles. Over 1,200 customers have been using the previous App that was launched several years ago.

"This new App will enable tenants and customers to make payments using their mobile device, or, for the first time, by using an exclusive App barcode on their mobile device at locations displaying the PayPoint sign. With hundreds of our customers and tenants already using PayPoint to manage other household bills, we hope our new App will provide an easy to use and convenient way for our tenants and customers to manage their payments.



"Customers who prefer to make payments with us by telephone can use our new automated payment line on 03303 903 048.

"This is a low cost number which is included in a large number of free-minute bundled talk packages with many mobile telephone service providers."

Once the App is installed, tenants and customers can store all their payment reference numbers, bank card details and payment amounts so they do not have to enter them every time they want to make a payment.

Using the new app, tenants and customers can:

- Use the PayPoint App barcode to make payments in any store displaying the PayPoint logo
- Manage payment cards customers can use the app to manage payments for several services rent and rates, service charges. Housing Benefit overpayments, damages/repair costs, legal costs, ground rent and barcoded invoice requests
- Manage their account details
- Access the PayPoint store locator
- View their payment history







#### Move to Universal Credit has commenced

The final phase of Universal Credit (UC) implementation across Northern Ireland has commenced for those in receipt of tax credits and no other benefits.

The 'Move to UC' started on Monday October 16th when Migration Notice letters will begin to issue across all postcodes to Working Tax Credits and/or Child Tax Credits recipients who receive no other benefit.

Universal Credit has been in place here since September 2017, replacing new claims to Income Support, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, income-related Employment & Support Allowance, Housing Benefit (rental) and tax credits. The final stage of the 'Move to UC' involves moving those who are still in receipt of the benefits and tax credits being replaced by Universal Credit.



Deputy Secretary of Work and Health at the Department for Communities, Paddy Rooney said: "We are approaching the final implementation stage of UC with the utmost care. "We will closely monitor the impact of implementation and ensure that all of the proper help, advice and support is available to everyone throughout the 'Move to UC' process."

Migration Notice letters will be issued from the Department explaining what people need to do and will include signposting to help for those who need it. Working Tax Credits and/or Child Tax Credits recipients who receive no other benefit do not need to do anything unless they receive a Migration Notice letter from DfC.

Housing Executive staff are very keen to engage with any potential residents who would like more information. Tim Gilpin, Rural and Regeneration Manager at the Housing Executive, explained: "A Rural Housing Needs Test is an opportunity for people in Moneyglass and the surrounding district to find out more about housing options in the area. Quite often, especially when we have very few social homes in an area, people don't see the value of coming forward to put their name on the waiting list. "But we use the local waiting list to determine housing need and to support housing associations in developing new homes, so it's vitally important that people tell us there is a demand.

"If we find there is demand for new homes, then we can engage with a housing association to examine the potential for a new-build scheme in the district. Breige Mullaghan, the Housing Executive's local Area Manager, is also urging local people to express an interest if they want to live in a social home.

She said: "This exercise will help us to determine the need for new housing in this area and I'd encourage interested local residents to get in touch.

"While the Rural and Regeneration Unit examines the potential for new housing, you will still be considered for any housing that might become available if you are already registered with us or a housing association."

#### Be Halloween Safe

Halloween can be an exciting time but it comes with an increase risk of accidental fires due to fireworks, candles, fancy dress and bonfires. These simple tips can make Halloween a safe night for everyone:

#### **Fireworks**

Greater availability has increased the popularity of fireworks yet, despite the warnings, their use can often end in disaster with a visit to the hospital. Remember:

- Outdoor fireworks cannot be bought in Northern Ireland without a licence.
- Ensure fireworks comply with BS-EN 15947 2015.
- Read the instructions carefully before use and always supervise children around fireworks.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box away from the reach of children.
- Only light fireworks outside in an open space; ensure anyone watching stands well back.
- Light them one at a time, at arm's length, using a taper.
- · Don't drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- Always supervise children around fireworks.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- Never go near a firework that has been lit even if it hasn't gone off; it could still explode.
- Keep pets indoors.

#### **Sparklers**

- Never give sparklers to children under the age of five.
- Always wear gloves with sparklers, 'preferably leather' and a coat if using when wearing Fancy Dress.
- Hold it at arm's length and never wave sparklers at someone else as you could burn them.
- When the sparkler has finished put it into a bucket of cold water immediately.

## **Fancy Dress**

Fancy Dress can be Highly Flammable and is not considered clothing but a toy in safety standards.

- As toys meet a lower fire safety standard than clothing, fancy dress MUST be kept away from NAKED FLAMES.
- Ensure fancy dress clothing has safety standard mark such as BS EN and a label: 'KEEP AWAY FROM FIRE' in red.
- If using sparklers get kids to don a coat and gloves.



- Washing fancy dress at more than 50 degrees Celsius will reduce fire resistance over time.
- Be sure everyone in fancy dress knows how to 'Stop Drop and Role' if their clothes catch fire'.
- Choose a costume and mask that doesn't restrict a child's visibility.
- Ensure children are supervised at all times.

#### **Road Safety**

- Halloween means that there will be more children out on the streets. Drivers need to take extra care especially when driving in residential areas. Drivers should:
- · Reduce their speed in residential areas.
- Watch out for children, many of whom will be wearing costumes with masks that often restrict their visibility and makes it more difficult for them to see when crossing the road.
- Remember to enter and exit driveways slowly and carefully.
- Reduce your distractions in the car and stay alert.

#### **Bonfires**

- Keep bonfires to a manageable size, in a clear space, at a safe distance from buildings and overhead cables.
- The bonfire should not contain potentially hazardous material which may explode or give off toxic fumes.
- Never use flammable liquids such as petrol or paraffin as these can produce explosive vapours.

#### **Tips for Parents and Carers**

- Remind children to be extra careful when crossing any roads.
- Choose a costume and mask that doesn't restrict a child's visibility.
- Provide children with a torch or glow stick as part of their costume.
- Avoid using a naked flame or candle in pumpkins; use a torch or battery-operated candle.
- Tell children to stay away from any naked flames.
   Be sure they know how to 'Stop, Drop and Roll' if their clothing catches fire and call 999 if required.

# **Policy and Practice Focus**

# Subject access requests (SARS) and Privacy notices

#### Sandra Bailie of NICVA writes

This is a resource based on the ICO guidance on subject access requests (SAR) for organisations and how to write and communicate privacy notices.

#### Subject Access Requests (SAR)

Individuals have the right to obtain a copy of their personal data (and other supplementary information). It does not entitle individuals to receive full copies of original documents. A SAR can be made in writing, verbally, or on social media. It must be provided free of charge

#### **Preparing for SARs**

- What personal information do you process?
- Is it kept up to date?
- Is it searchable and clearly labelled?
- Do you have a retention policy?
- Are staff adequately trained?
- Do your staff use personal devices for work?
- Do any third-party service providers process personal data on your behalf?

#### **Exemptions**

- There are several exemptions from the right of access.
- Not all the exemptions apply in the same way.
- Should be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- You should justify and document your reasons for relying on an exemption.

#### **Dealing with information request**

ICO has a step-by-step guide to dealing with an information request

- 1. Choose a data protection lead
- 2. Know who you're dealing with
- 3. Check the request is valid
- 4. Set reminders
- Consider the request what have they asked to see
- 6. Search for the information
- 7. Consider what you need to redact
- 8. Consider the impact of releasing information about other people
- 9. Prepare your reply
- 10. Send your reply securely and keep a record of what you've sent

#### **Privacy Notices**

Before you begin: think about what data do you hold and map out information flows. You need to be able to answer a number of questions. This will then allow you to work out what needs to go into your privacy notice.

#### How to provide privacy information

You can provide this information through a variety of media:

- Orally face to face or when you speak to someone on the telephone (it's a good idea to document this).
- In writing printed media; printed adverts; forms, such as financial applications or job application forms
- Through signage for example, an information poster in a public area.
- Electronically in text messages; on websites; in emails; in mobile app

#### Tips on presenting privacy information:

- Use clear, straightforward language.
- Adopt a style that your audience will understand.
- Don't assume that everybody has the same level of understanding as you.
- Avoid confusing terminology or legalistic language.
- Draw on research about features of effective privacy notices.
- Align to your house style.
- Align with your organisation's values and principles.
- Be truthful. Don't offer people choices that are counter-intuitive or misleading.
- Follow any specific sectoral rules.
- Ensure all your notices are consistent and can be updated rapidly.
- Provide separate notices for different audiences

# **LCCC Hardship Funding Programme 2023/24**

Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council has developed a Hardship Funding Programme to support constituted/ legally governed community and voluntary /not for profit organisations to address hardship due to the current cost of living crisis, particularly the increase in energy and food costs. There is an overall allocation of £140,000 available.

The Hardship Funding Programme is developed in recognition of the difficult financial circumstances which currently exist in the community and voluntary sector, especially in respect of covering basic overheads which have increased substantially in cost.

The closing date for receipt of applications is 12 noon Friday 3rd November. Late applications will not be accepted.

This fund aims to assist local grass roots groups to:

- keep their community buildings operational for existing services
- · provide additionality in programming for local

community/individuals who are facing hardship

- enhance service delivery by keeping facilities open and possibly longer during the autumn/winter months
- provide sustenance and resources for the local community/individuals including supporting or developing community fridge initiatives, addressing fuel poverty, holiday hunger initiatives and/or meal projects
- develop or enhance a community planting scheme for materials to grow and supply perishable goods in their community.

### **Sports Group Grants**

The Public Health Agency, through the Clear Project, are offering constituted voluntary sector sports clubs in the <u>Western Trust area</u> the opportunity to avail of training, which will help them support their members and receive up to £500 worth of relevant sports equipment for their club.

In order to receive this aid clubs must:

- Be a constituted voluntary sector sports club and enclose a copy of this document and a list of their committee members.
- Be appropriately insured or prepared to obtain appropriate insurance if awarded.
- Enclose the most recent annual accounts or statement of income and expenditure which must be approved and signed by an officeholder.
- Operate within the Western Trust area.
- Have a significant impact upon or involvement from their local community.
- Must have <u>a minimum of 3 to 5 members</u> attend training, either <u>safeTALK</u> or another relevant approved mental health programme (<u>Level 1 Sport NI Level 1 Mental Health Awareness e-learning module</u> and Zero Suicide Alliance).

Please note: This must be members who have a significant input / involvement / role within the club.

Equipment requested should help the club develop activities that meet the needs of the local community and support the delivery of the 'Take 5 Steps to Wellbeing'. These are five simple steps to help maintain and improve your wellbeing through the themes of 'Connect', 'Be active', 'Take Notice', 'Keep Learning' and 'Give'.

To claim funding from the Clear project clubs will be asked to:

- 1. Submit grant application, then once accepted complete training.
- 2. Seek out a quote for the equipment (quote to be approved by the Clear Project).





- Pay the chosen supplier directly. Where a club cannot provide sufficient evidence of proper financial processes, the Clear Project will pay for direct invoices/items needed.
- 4. Submit an invoice made out to the Clear Project for the amount spent, accompanied with the receipt/s as proof of purchase.

If the club does not have the finances, then requests for advance payment will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Any relevant sports club within the Western Trust area can apply for the funding however preference will be given to:

- Groups operating in the top 20% most disadvantaged Super output areas (SOA's).
- Those with lower capacity.

Please note: The funding award will not be released until all training has been completed, and all paperwork has been returned. All training must be completed by 31st January 2024.

Closing date for application is Monday 6th November, at 3pm

## Renewable Energy Fund

Sport NI Renewable Energy Fund is a £1million pound National Lottery investment for 2023/24, which seeks to reduce the environmental impact of sports clubs throughout Northern Ireland.

The Renewable Energy Fund has one overarching objective:

"To reduce the environmental impact of sports clubs in Northern Ireland."

However, the programme also has secondary objectives, which reflect commitments made in Sport NI's Corporate Plan – The Power of Sport (2021-2026), including:

- To reduce the environmental footprint of sports clubs.
- To reduce carbon emissions at sports clubs.
- To contribute to a more sustainable sports club network.
- To create a 'greener' sports club sector.
- To save on utility bills and reduce costs, enabling sports clubs to redirect resources back into their clubs/sport.

REMEMBER: any applicant making an application must also complete an <u>Environmental Sustainability Survey</u> to be eligible.

#### HOW THIS PROGRAMME WILL BE DELIVERED

In 2023/24 the Renewable Energy Fund will operate as a 'pilot programme'. Subsequently, the 'pilot' will not use scoring criteria and applications will not be assessed. The primary purpose of the pilot programme is to provide learning to Sport NI so that we become more knowledgeable about types of energy interventions and their impact, as well as helping to shape future rounds of the Renewable Energy Fund (subject to budget availability).

The application form takes approximately 1-2 minutes to complete. Applications to this Pilot Programme will be selected at random (process outlined in the information and guidance notes), with those selected progressing with project delivery. The programme is being delivered in two main stages:

Project Development and Project Delivery.

At the Project Development stage, applicants will be



required to procure an energy consultant to undertake a 'building energy survey' which will identify potential energy projects (more information at Chapter 11). At the development stage the maximum project value will be £3,000.

At the Project Delivery stage, applicants will procure suppliers/contractors to undertake the installation works for the preferred energy project (more information at Chapter 11). At the delivery stage the maximum project value will be £30,000.

#### WHO CAN APPLY?

The Renewable Energy Fund Pilot Programme will ONLY accept applications from the following organisations who either own or operate their own sports facilities:

 Sports clubs (affiliated to a Sport Northern Ireland recognised governing body of sport).

#### WHAT TYPE OF PROJECTS CAN BE FUNDED?

Sport NI are interested in taking forward the following types of energy projects within sports clubs:

- Solar Energy Systems (and ancillary equipment).
- Air Source Heating Systems (and ancillary equipment).
- Ground Source Heating Systems (and ancillary equipment).
- Sustainable Water Recycling Systems.
- Fixed Floodlight Upgrades (Specifically upgrades to LED Bulbs and Connection to Grid).

Sport NI may consider alternative interventions if recommended in your club energy audit, and if the benefits of that intervention have been clearly articulated.

EA Foundation Offers Funding to Improve Lives of Disadvantaged Communities

The EA Foundation was established in 2021 by the cofounders of Energy Aspects, a data & intelligence company headquartered in the UK. The EA Foundation has been set up to improve the lives of disadvantaged communities around the world. To date, the EA Foundation has received over £5 million of donations, which it will distribute over the coming years.

The funding is intended for charitable projects which align to at least one of the following four funding priorities:

- Provide educational opportunities, particularly for disadvantaged individuals and communities.
- Improve access to basic services and infrastructure to disadvantaged communities, including but not limited to healthcare, clean water and electricity.
- Support people in reduced circumstances, without sufficient means, or those who are experiencing times of need thereby providing important support for the relief of poverty or other forms of disadvantage such as disability.
- Address environmental challenges and promote sustainable development, both and through the pursuit of the other key areas of focus.



There is no specified upper or lower grant limits. However, based on the Foundation's current giving trends to date, the grants approved have averaged between £20,000 - £50,000 for an average duration of 12-24 months. Applicants are encouraged to operate a full cost recovery mode by including all relevant costs of their project in the budget, including proportionate costs of overheads related to the effective delivery of the project.

UK-based charitable entities can apply. Applications will be considered from a diverse range of organisations irrespective of turnover.

The deadline for applications is 6 November 2023 (12 noon BST).

# Funding to Help Disadvantaged Groups to Improve their Communication Skills (UK)



We recognise that health is impacted by much more than the everyday lifestyle decisions that we make, important as they are. Research shows that social isolation can be as damaging for your health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. With this in mind, our projects aim to address these wider issues and tackle the root causes of poor health. These vary greatly for different groups of people and may include mental health issues, housing issues, low educational attainment, poverty or debt. Group work and relationship building is at the core of all our projects. By sharing our assets, our lived experiences and supporting each other we can achieve great things.

### A Million & Me – Big Sky Programme

BBC Children in Need is here to make sure that every child has the childhood they deserve and the support they need to thrive.

Our A Million & Me fund supports children aged 8-13 years old. It focuses on their emotional wellbeing and mental health.

This fund aims to provide support at an early stage, before mental health problems are established. As part of this programme, we focused on the impact of geographic isolation on children's emotional wellbeing and mental health. Research by the Centre for Mental Health (report) highlights the voices of children are often absent from consultations. Dedicated support and funding should be allocated to reaching children in remote communities.

The Big Sky programme has been developed in response to these needs.

Grants are for early intervention approaches. These grants will support the emotional wellbeing and mental health of children aged 8-13 years living in spatially isolated communities.

- This is an invite only programme for organisations working in rural, remote and island areas.
- As applications are by invitation only, they will be

developed through conversations with BBC Children in Need teams in each of the 4 nations and draws on our local knowledge and insight.



- We are committed to funding grassroot organisations across the UK, providing those vital positive relationships that support good emotional wellbeing and mental health.
- Funding of up to £5,000 will be awarded although we expect there to be mix in the range of grants awarded.
- Organisations can apply for up to 2 years, with no application deadlines. Applications must fit within BBC CiN localised funding plans and rural identifiers developed at a local level. Contact details for local teams are here.
- Applicants may already hold a grant with us but we are keen to target organisations and groups that have not been funded by us.
- Organisations will only be able to hold one Big Sky grant.

Funding is available for community groups, businesses and statutory bodies in Northern Ireland to purchase equipment for projects to reduce marine litter.



The programme is inviting applications from a range of voluntary and community groups and organisations, schools, statutory bodies and businesses from across Northern Ireland. The grants are not restricted to coastal areas, so groups from anywhere in Northern Ireland may apply.

The funding will support organisations and groups to purchase and install capital items to:

- Prevent litter and plastic pollution from entering the marine environment.
- Enhance the environmental management of a local area to reduce marine litter.
- Improve the health and wellbeing of communities and marine biodiversity recovery by helping to improve and/or maintain the quality of public open spaces.
- Improve the quality of their local environment by changing behaviour through creative concepts to

reduce the incidence of littering.





- Constituted groups, businesses and statutory bodies grants of between £500 and £40,000.
- Non-constituted groups grants of between £500 and £5,000.

Applicants should note the average grant is likely to be a lot less than the maximum, which will only be awarded for exceptionally innovative or strategically significant projects. Collaborative applications are welcomed.

Council and business applicants must provide 50% match funding for their project, while schools must demonstrate how they will use any assets purchased in an educational context.

**Together: Building a United Community (T:BUC)**Applicants are required to outline the outcome in Together: Building a United Community to which the proposed project will contribute.



The <u>Together: Building a United Community Strategy</u>, published on 23 May 2013, reflects the Executive's commitment to improving community relations and continuing the journey towards a more united and shared society.
