Measuring Impact Pilot

The increasing importance of community groups being able to demonstrate the impact they are having led to the development and delivery of our Measuring Impact Awareness training piloted in Causeway, South Down and South & East Belfast.

The STAR Awards (Showcasing Teamwork, Awarding Recognition) are an awards initiative coordinated by AONTAS as part of the annual Adult Learners' Festival to acknowledge the fantastic work undertaken by adult learning initiatives throughout Ireland.

Stephanie McKillop, SC Digital Inclusion Officer, has been working to bring the benefits of going online to communities throughout Northern Ireland for over 5 years, and her hard work is showing some impressive results. Ever since partnering with the Department of Finance's Go On NI initiative in 2012, Supporting Communities have trained over 1200 people in basic digital skills.

'Digital 4 Communities' (D4C) Project







In 2016 the NI Housing Executive, in conjunction with Supporting Communities, launched a pilot project designed to make digital services accessible to those who previously have found it difficult to avail of these services. The project provides tenants with home broadband and a tablet as well as hardware. Supporting Communities facilitate training sessions to enable the participants to utilise online services and bring them into the digital age.





The project has completed 'Phase 1' in 4 areas of Northern Ireland; West Belfast, North Belfast, Newtownards and Fermanagh with 52 initial participants. The project training included basic online skills with all participants working with their own tablets and their own personal email/facebook/skype accounts.

Supporting Communities delivered the first phase of the developed training in an 8 week programme and enabled

participants to access a variety of online services such as emailing, skyping, accessing websites such as the Housing Executive website eg reporting repairs and maintenance issues to the Housing Executive. Practical help was also provided in completing tasks with participants such as; shopping and banking online and taxing their cars. As part of the project, networking opportunities have arisen and weekly interaction with each other means the participants have built a rapport with other users and by joining the dedicated Facebook Group. They also have a platform to communicate with each other for peer support and trainers can upload resources and tutorials in between formal training sessions.

Phase 2 of the project is about to begin and promises to bring with it more exciting opportunities for those involved.



Empowering Communities Enterprise Ltd



Supporting Communities Board, at their meeting of 24th November 2016 agreed to proceed to form a new company.

In January 2017, Empowering Communities Enterprise Ltd was registered with Companies House as a Company Ltd by Shares. The Company has been established to support and diversify on the work of its sole shareholder, Supporting Communities and to be a vehicle for Supporting Communities to deliver the requirements of the Independent Tenant Organisation role for Social Landlords.

Independent Tenant Organisation (ITO)

In February 2017 Supporting Communities were named as the ITO following a procurement exercise carried out by the Dept for Communities. The ITO will be tasked with the responsibility for overseeing the implementation of the Tenant Participation Strategy for NI 2015-2020 and to support all Social Housing tenants and staff to develop the skills needed for effective participation.



In welcoming the news, Supporting Communities Chair - Lorraine Campbell (pictured left with Colm) said; "Supporting Communities has a long tradition of promoting, developing and sustaining effective tenant participation for the social housing sector in NI. We look forward to continuing to provide that support to all social landlords in the future.

We know that involving tenants not only helps landlords deliver a better service but also helps provide better value for the money. Supporting Communities looks forward to playing our part as the Independent Tenant Organisation in achieving these benefits for all social landlords."

Measuring Impact

Over the last year and following our impressive Social Return on Investment (SROI) ratio of 8:1 as highlighted in the Impact Report by Gauge NI, we at Supporting Communities have not rested on our laurels. Since last year, we have set up an Impact Working Group to begin looking at measuring our own Impact. Due to the wide range of services provided by Supporting Communities, we felt it was practical to look in the first instance at our Funding and Digital Inclusion Services. This is a work in progress but the indications are that this area of work alone is generating a significant impact for the communities which we serve. Measuring our impact also allows us to adapt and improve our services further where required.

We aim to extend this work to ultimately look at assessing our impact across the full range of services provided by Supporting Communities. To help us achieve this, we are currently looking at utilising some suitable software. In the future, we may also engage an outside independent organisation to qualify our findings.

At Supporting Communities, we believe very strongly in the ability to look critically at our work and to engage with stakeholders to measure our Impact and gauge how we are making a difference to people's lives. As mentioned earlier in this year's report, this is what led us to develop our own inhouse Impact Awareness Course which has been piloted and has proven useful so far in helping Community Groups get on to the 'Path to Impact.'
